


Our Founder


Our Inspiration

The institution helps cultivate a climate of enquiry, questioning, and freedom to explore and contribute answers to problems, small and large, local or global.



It gives me immense pleasure to endorse the activities of National Service Scheme (NSS) Unit of KJSIEIT through this e-booklet.



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World Blood Donor Day


Greetings,

World Blood Donor Day takes place on 14 June each year. The aim is to raise global awareness of the need for safe blood and blood products for transfusion and of the critical contribution voluntary, unpaid blood donors make to national health systems. The day also provides an opportunity to call to action to governments and national health authorities to provide adequate resources and put into place systems and infrastructures to increase the collection of blood from voluntary, non-remunerated blood donors.

Safe blood and blood products and their transfusion are a critical aspect of care and public health. They save millions of lives and improve the health and quality of life of many patients every day. The need for blood is universal, but access to blood for all those who need it is not. Blood shortages are particularly acute in developing countries.

To ensure that everyone who needs safe blood has access to it, all countries need voluntary, unpaid donors who give blood regularly. Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, despite limited mobility and other challenges, blood donors in many countries have continued to donate blood and plasma to patients who need transfusion. This extraordinary effort during a time of unprecedented crisis highlights the crucial role of well-organized, committed voluntary, non-remunerated blood donors in ensuring a safe and sufficient blood supply during normal and emergency times.



Focus of 2021 campaign

For 2021, the World Blood Donor Day slogan will be **"Give blood and keep the world beating"**. The message highlights the essential contribution blood donors make to keeping the world pulsating by saving lives and improving others' health. It reinforces the global call for more people all over the world to donate blood regularly and contribute to better health.

A special focus of this year's campaign will be the role of young people in ensuring a safe blood supply. In many countries, young people have been at the forefront of activities and initiatives aimed at achieving safe blood supplies through voluntary, non-remunerated blood donations. Young people form a large sector of the population in many societies and are generally full of idealism, enthusiasm and creativity.

The specific objectives of this year's campaign are to:

- thank blood donors in the world and create wider public awareness of the need for regular, unpaid blood donation;
- promote the community values of blood donation in enhancing community solidarity and social cohesion;
- encourage youth to embrace the humanitarian call to donate blood and inspire others to do the same;
- celebrate the potential of youth as partners in promoting health.




"It is a day to be proud of who you are. Let's celebrate neurodiversity"






International Yoga Day

History of International Yoga Day:



To bolster recognition of the Day and the value of public service, the United Nations established the UN Public Service Awards (UNPSA) programme in 2003, which was reviewed in 2016 to align with the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. The UNPSA aims to promote and reward innovation and excellence in public services by recognizing the creative achievements and contributions of public institutions that lead to a more effective and responsive public administration in countries worldwide in support of sustainable development.

Technology and data driven innovations have increased the pace of our daily life, opened up information and elevated civil society voices and changed how we solve problems, design policy and deliver services. The 2020 Covid-19 pandemic was a force multiplier to these trends, introducing remote work in government, digital service delivery, virtual service teams, and even new portfolios.



Today, every country in the world needs to re-think the structure and operating model of its civil service. The future public service needs to be more agile, tech-savvy, data-driven, and human-centric. These are core elements to build future readiness, ensure inclusive policies and responsive services, to reduce inequalities and to raise trust in government.

To celebrate the 2021 United Nations Public Service Day, the Division of Public Institutions and Digital Government of the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs, in collaboration with the government of the United Arab Emirates will host a 1.5-hour virtual event on the 23 June under the theme of “Innovating the Future Public Service: New Government Models for a New Era to Reach the SDGs”. The event will bring together key stakeholders, public servants and UN officials to honor the work of public servants.

International Olympic Day 2021: History



World Olympic Day 2021: Significance & Theme

The day is celebrated to encourage more people to participate in the Olympic Games and spread awareness about the event and promote the Olympic Movement. Based on the three pillars – “move”, “learn” and “discover” – the National Olympic Committees are deploying sports, cultural and educational activities to encourage participation regardless of age, gender, social background, or sporting ability. In some countries, the event is incorporated into the school curriculum, while many NOCs have included concerts and exhibitions as a part of the Olympic day in recent years. Recent NOC activities also

included meetings for children and young people with top athletes making it easier for people to become part of Olympic Day. The theme for this year is Stay healthy, stay strong, stay active with the #OlympicDay workout on 23 June.






Asteroid Day (also known as International Asteroid Day) is an annual global event which is held on the anniversary of the Siberian Tunguska event that took place on **June 30, 1908**, the most harmful known asteroid-related event on Earth in recent history. The United Nations has proclaimed it to be observed globally on **June 30** every year in its resolution. Asteroid Day aims to raise awareness about asteroids and what can be done to protect the Earth, its families, communities, and future generations from a catastrophic event.



The workgroup of Asteroid Day created a declaration called "100X Declaration", which appeals to all scientists and technologists who are supporting the idea of saving the earth from asteroids, but not only specialists are asked to sign, everyone can sign this declaration. Today, the 100X Declaration has been signed by more than 22,000 private citizens.

More than 1M asteroids have the potential to impact Earth and through all the available telescopes worldwide, we have discovered only about one percent. The 100X Declaration calls for increasing the asteroid discovery rate to 100,000 (or 100x) per year within the next 10 years. “The more we learn about asteroid impacts, the clearer it becomes that the human race has been living on borrowed time,” remarked Brian May. “Asteroid Day and the 100X Declaration are ways for the public to contribute to an awareness of the Earth’s vulnerability and the realization that Asteroids hit Earth all the time.” Asteroid Day is a vehicle to garner public support to increase our knowledge of when asteroids might strike and how we can protect ourselves.”

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National Doctors' Day



Over 250 species have become entangled in plastic, whilst entanglement rates of approximately eight percent have been discovered in some sea lion and seal species.

The simplest thing you can do is choose paper or cloth over plastic, or even better bring your own bags to retailers to pick up goods. World Population Day

World Population Day is an annual event, observed on July 11 every year, which seeks to raise awareness of global population issues. The event was established by the Governing Council of the United Nations Development Programme in 1989. It was inspired by the public interest in Five Billion Day on July 11, 1987, the approximate date on which the world's population reached five billion people. World Population Day aims to increase people's awareness on various population issues such as the importance of family planning, gender equality, poverty, maternal health and human rights.



This year, the theme of World Population Day 2021 is **'the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on fertility'**. It will be observed to draw focus on the importance of sexual and reproductive health, which is deeply affected by the Covid-19 pandemic.

The pandemic has compromised health care systems particularly in the area of sexual and reproductive health. It also exposed and exacerbated gender-based inequities: gender-based violence increased under lockdown, as did the risk of child marriage and female genital mutilation as programmes to abolish the harmful practices were disrupted. Significant numbers of women left the labour force – their often low-paying jobs were eliminated or caregiving responsibilities for children learning remotely or for homebound older people increased – destabilizing their finances, not just for now but in the long run.


Against this backdrop, many countries are expressing growing concern over changing fertility rates. Historically, alarmism over fertility rates has led to abrogations of human rights.

World Population Day significance:

It took hundreds of thousands of years for the world population to grow to 1 billion – then in just another 200 years or so, it grew sevenfold. In 2011, the global population reached the 7 billion mark, and today, it stands at about 7.7 billion, and it's expected to grow to around 8.5 billion in 2030, 9.7 billion in 2050, and 10.9 billion in 2100. This dramatic growth has been driven largely by increasing numbers of people surviving to reproductive age, and has been accompanied by major changes in fertility rates, increasing

urbanization and accelerating migration. These trends will have far-reaching implications for generations to come.

The recent past has seen enormous changes in fertility rates and life expectancy. In the early 1970s, women had on average 4.5 children each; by 2015, total fertility for the world had fallen to below 2.5 children per woman. Meanwhile, average global life spans have risen, from 64.6 years in the early 1990s to 72.6 years in 2019. In addition, the world is seeing high levels of urbanization and accelerating migration. 2007 was the first year in which more people lived in urban areas than in rural areas, and by 2050 about 66 per cent of the world population will be living in cities.



These megatrends have far-reaching implications. They affect economic development, employment, income distribution, poverty and social protections. They also affect efforts to ensure universal access to health care, education, housing, sanitation, water, food and energy. To more sustainably address the needs of individuals, policymakers must understand how many people are living on the planet, where they are, how old they are, and how many people will come after them.

It is really important to spread awareness about population issues. The NSS unit of KJSIEIT wishes everyone happy World Population Day and hope that we can make the world a better place by taking a step towards controlling the population.




NELSON MANDELA DAY




International Chess Day: History

The General Assembly proclaimed 20 July as World Chess Day on 12 December 2019, to mark the date of the establishment of the International Chess Federation (FIDE) in Paris in 1924. Under the initiative of FIDE, 20 July has been observed as International Chess Day by chess players around the world since 1966.



No doubt, this day celebrates the long history of chess and the role it played in societies. Chess has broken several barriers whether class, language and culture. It is just simply two people sitting down to play one of the most mentally challenging games in the world. Today, almost every city has one or more chess clubs, to boost the game, fans, and admirers of this peaceful sport.



To mark the occasion, All India Radio (AIR) had organized a symposium on the subject *Creation of New India and Broadcasting Medium* in New Delhi.



History of National Broadcasting Day:

- The first radio broadcast was made on July 23, 1927, from Bombay Station. The station was then owned by a private company called the Indian Broadcasting Company.
- The Government took over the broadcasting on April 1, 1930, and renamed it as Indian State Broadcasting Service (ISBS).
- It was initially on an experimental basis. Later it permanently came under government control in 1932.
- On 8th of June, 1936, the Indian State Broadcasting Service became All India Radio. Currently, AIR is one of the largest public broadcasting organisations in the world.



The day is celebrated every year to commemorate the first and last visit of the Father of the Nation, Mahatma Gandhi to the studio of All India Radio, Delhi in 1947. The Father of the Nation addressed the displaced people, who had temporarily settled at Kurukshetra in Haryana after partition.



Guru Purnima


Greetings,

The celebration of **Guru Purnima** is marked by spiritual activities and may include a ritualistic event in honor of the Guru; that is, the teachers which is called *Guru Pooja*.

The word Guru is derived from two words, *gu* and *ru*. The Sanskrit root *gu* means darkness or ignorance, and *ru* denotes the remover of that darkness. Therefore, a Guru is one who removes the darkness of our ignorance. Gurus are believed by many to be the most necessary part of life. On this day, disciples offer pooja (worship) or pay respect to their Guru (spiritual guide). In addition to having religious importance, this festival has great importance for Indian academics and scholars. Indian academics celebrate this day by thanking their teachers as well as remembering past teachers and scholars.



This was the day when Krishna-Dwaipayana Vyasa – author of the Mahabharata – was born to sage Parashara and a fisherman's daughter Satyawati; thus this day is also celebrated as *Vyasa Purnima*. Veda Vyasa did yeoman service to the cause of Vedic studies by gathering all the Vedic hymns extant during his times, dividing them into four parts based on their use in the rites, characteristics and teaching them to his four chief disciples – Paila, Vaisampayana, Jaimini and Sumantu. It was this dividing and editing that earned him the honorific "Vyasa" (vyas = to edit, to divide). "He divided the Holy Veda into four, namely Rig, Yajur, Sama and Atharva. The histories and the Puranas are said to be the fifth Veda."



Irrespective of their religions, Indian academics celebrate this day by thanking their teachers. Many schools, colleges and universities have events in which students thank their teachers and remember past scholars. Alumni visit their teachers and present gifts as a gesture of gratitude. Students may arrange different art-competitions accordingly. The main tradition among guru-shishya is blessings (i.e. student greet his/her guru) by reciting a poetry or quote and the guru gives blessings for the success and happiness of an individual. In India, Hindu disciples often worship their spiritual teacher (or his idol) on the day of Guru Purnima.

Kargil Vijay Diwas

"TOUGH TIMES DON'T LAST, TOUGH MEN DO"

The Kargil War is also known as the Kargil conflict. It was fought between May-July of 1999 in the Kargil district of Jammu and Kashmir along the Line of Control (LoC) in which India got the victory. Therefore, the day is dedicated to the martyred soldiers of the Kargil war.

This is the day to pay homage to the Kargil martyrs and to remember the supreme sacrifice made by our brave soldiers, to uphold and safeguard the integrity of the nation.



Kargil war took place in the Kargil District of Jammu and Kashmir, along the Line of Control (LoC). Pakistan's army sent its soldiers in the name of intruders in the winters to take over the area. Their main objective was to cut the connections between Ladakh and Kashmir and to create tensions at the Indian border. Let us tell you that the intruders at that time were on the top whereas the Indians were on the downhill and so it was easy for them to attack. Finally, the war broke out between the two sides. Pakistani soldiers crossed the Line of Control that is LOC and entered the India-controlled area.

On **3rd May 1999** Pakistan started this war when it had infiltrated into the high altitudes in the rocky mountainous region of Kargil with around **5000** soldiers and captured it. When the Indian Government got the information about it '**Operation Vijay**' was launched by the Indian army to throw back the intruders who had treacherously occupied Indian Territory.


Do you know the scenario before the Kargil War? In 1998-1999 during the winters, the Pakistani Army secretly started training and sending troops near Kargil to dominate the region with the goal of claiming Siachen Glacier. Further, the Pakistan Army exclaimed that they were not the Pakistani soldiers but the Mujahideen. Actually, Pakistan wanted international attention on the dispute so that pressure could be generated on the Indian army to withdraw its army from the Siachen Glacier region and force India to negotiate for the Kashmir dispute.

The story behind the war: After the Indo-Pak war of 1971 there have been many military conflicts. Both the countries conducted nuclear tests in 1998 which had further escalated tensions. To calm the situation in February 1999, the two countries signed The Lahore Declaration, promising to provide a peaceful and bilateral solution to the Kashmir conflict.

But what happened was that Pakistani Armed Forces started sending its soldiers and paramilitary forces across the Line of Control into the territory on the Indian side and the infiltration was code-named "Operation Badr." Its main objective was to break the link between Kashmir and Ladakh and to withdraw the Indian Army from the Siachen Glacier. At the same time, Pakistan believed that creating any kind of tension in this area would help in making the Kashmir issue an international issue, helping it to secure a speedy resolution.

The IAF, for ground attack, used planes MiG-21s, MiG-23s, MiG-27s, Jaguars, and the Mirage-2000. Mainly, for air interception with a secondary role of ground attack, MiG-21 was built. To attack the targets on the ground, MiG-23s and 27s were optimised. Several targets of Pakistan were attacked. Therefore, IAF's MiG-21s and Mirage 2000 were extensively used in **Operation Safed Sagar** during this war.

A large number of rockets and bombs were used in this war. About two lakh fifty thousand shells, bombs, and rockets were fired. Approximately 5,000 artillery shells, mortar bombs, and rockets were fired daily from 300 guns, mortars, and MBRLs while 9,000 shells were fired the day Tiger Hill was regained. It is said that this was the only war after World War II in which such a large number of bombardments were carried out on the enemy army. Finally, India won a determined victory.



It would not be wrong to say that the War was never good. This causes a major loss on both sides, thousands of soldiers get martyred. India is a peace-loving country that does not believe in war. Indian army always safeguards the nation from alien forces, sacrifices for the Motherland, and makes us proud.

This year's theme is **"Hepatitis Can't Wait"**. With a person dying every 30 seconds from a hepatitis related illness – even in the current COVID-19 crisis – we can't wait to act on viral hepatitis. There are five main strains of the hepatitis virus – A, B, C, D and E. Together, hepatitis B and C are the most common which result in 1.1 million deaths and 3 million new infections per year.

World Hepatitis Day is recognized annually on July 28th, the birthday of Dr. Baruch Blumberg (1925–2011). Dr. Blumberg discovered the hepatitis B virus in 1967, and 2 years later he developed the first hepatitis B vaccine. These achievements culminated in Dr. Blumberg winning the Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine in 1976.



Globally, most people who need treatment have not been treated, largely due to a lack of awareness, and access to hepatitis treatment services. Over 90% of people with hepatitis C can be completely cured of the virus within 3–6 months. Appropriate treatment of hepatitis B and C can prevent the development of the major life-threatening complications of chronic liver disease: cirrhosis and liver cancer.





Quit India Movement






International Day of the World's Indigenous People



A person can pledge for organ donation at any time during their life by filling out a donor form, which can be received from ORBO either in person or by mail:


Step 1: Get the donor form from the official website.


Preparations for Independence Day start a month in advance. Schools and colleges organise cultural events, competitions, debates, speeches, and quiz competitions.

During the Second World War in 1942, the Indian Congress launched the Quit India Movement demanding an end to the British rule which prompted colonial rulers detaining many campaigners, nationalists, and ministers including Gandhi.

During the partition of India in 1947, violent riots, mass casualties, and displacement of nearly 15 million people took place amid religious violence.







The Sanskrit language is believed to have originated in India around 3,500 years ago. The term Sanskrit is derived from the conjoining of the prefix 'Sam' meaning 'Samyak' which indicates 'entirely' and 'krit' indicates 'done'. In terms of communication, reading and hearing Sanskrit terms indicates perfectly or entirely done. Sanskrit, in literary terms, is classified into two different periods, the Vedic and Classical. In the Vedas sacred texts,

Vedic Sanskrit is found mainly in the Rig Veda, the Puranas and the Upanishads. The Vedas were composed in the period 1,000 to 500 BC.





This International Day is intended to inscribe the tragedy of the slave trade in the memory of all peoples. In accordance with the goals of the intercultural project "The Slave Route", it should offer an opportunity for collective consideration of the historic causes, the methods and the consequences of this tragedy, and for an analysis of the interactions to which it has given rise between Africa, Europe, the Americas and the Caribbean.

The Director-General of UNESCO invites the Ministers of Culture of all Member States to organize events every year on that date, involving the entire population of their country and in particular young people, educators, artists and intellectuals.



International Day for the Remembrance of the Slave Trade and its Abolition was first celebrated in a number of countries, in particular in Haiti (23 August 1998) and Goree in Senegal (23 August 1999). Cultural events and debates too were organized. The year 2001 saw the participation of the Mulhouse Textile Museum in France in the form of a workshop for fabrics called "Indiennes de Traite" (a type of calico) which served as currency for the exchange of slaves in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. Circular CL/3494 of 29 July 1998 from the Director-General to Ministers of Culture invites all the Member States to organize events to mark 23 August each year. The UNESCO Executive Board adopted Resolution 29 C/40 at its 29th session.






The **National Sports Day** in India is celebrated on **29 August**, on the birth anniversary of hockey player Major Dhyan Chand, one of the best sportsmen ever to have graced the game of hockey. Hockey always has a special place among Indians. Our generation sometimes looks back with a sense of disbelief about the golden era of Indian hockey, when India won three Olympic gold medals in field hockey in 1928, 1932 and 1936. That era was led by none other than Dhyan Chand who scored 33 goals in 12 matches. Dhyan Chand was born in Allahabad to Sameshwar Dutt Singh. Dhyan Chand joined the Indian Army at the age of 16 and never played hockey during his childhood. Slowly he was attracted to the game and progressed quickly to represent India. He scored 570 goals in his career, from 1926 to 1949 (according to his autobiography, Goals).



In the 1936 Olympics, Dhyan Chand displayed such unbelievable skills with his hockey stick that a German newspaper carried a banner headline, "The Olympic complex now has a magic show too." The next day, posters were displayed all over Berlin which showed "Visit the hockey stadium to watch the Indian magician Dhyan Chand in action." There is also a legendary story saying that his skills were so good and godly that at one instance his opponents went on to physically check his hockey stick to see if there was a special glue which stuck the ball to his stick.

After putting his stamp on the international hockey arena, and having served his country to reach its pinnacles of glory multiple times, Dhyan Chand passed away on 3 December 1979. He remains a legendary figure in Indian and world hockey. The most noted memorials for

him is the Major Dyanchand Awards ,the highest award for lifetime achievement in sports and games in India , and the National Sport day celebrations on his birthday.



A sport is a very important activity for students. It's one activity which can help us to develop multiple qualities like a sense of togetherness, leadership skills, stamina, physical strength, planning and strategy, patriotism and team work-the qualities which helps us to excel in life. National Sports day is not only a tribute to one of the greatest in the game; it also reminds us the importance of sports in our life.







Ganesh Chaturthi

Ganesh Chaturthi is a ten-day Hindu festival celebrated to honour the elephant-headed God Ganesha's birthday. He is the younger son of Lord Shiva and Goddess Parvati.

Ganesha is known by 108 different names and is the Lord of arts and sciences and the deva of wisdom. He is honoured at the start of rituals and ceremonies as he's considered the God of beginnings. He's widely and dearly referred to as Ganapati or Vinayaka.



There are two different versions about Ganesha's birth. The famous one is that Goddess Parvati created Ganesha out of dirt off her body while having a bath and set him to guard her door while she finishes her bath. Shiva who had gone out, returned at that time, but as Ganesha didn't know of him, stopped him from entering. Angry Shiva severed the head of Ganesha after a combat between the two. Parvati was enraged and Shiva promised Ganesha will live again. The devas who went in search of a head facing north of a dead person could manage only the head of an elephant. Shiva fixed the elephant's head on the child and brought him back to life.

Ganesh Chaturthi is one of the most important Hindu festivals and it's dedicated to Lord Ganesh. On this day, Lord Ganesh is worshipped as the god of wisdom, prosperity, and good fortune. It is believed that Lord Ganesh was born during Shukla Paksha of Bhadrapada month.

Lord Ganesh is also known as Vighnaharta (the one who removes obstacles), and hence he is worshipped first before initiating a new venture, work, or auspicious beginning like marriage or Griha Pravesh.

Maharashtra is well-known for its grand scale Ganesh Chaturthi celebration. Well, this wasn't the case many years ago. It was only In 1893, the Indian freedom fighter Lokmanya Tilak praised the celebration of Sarvajanic Ganesh Utsav in his newspaper, Kesari, and dedicated his efforts to launch the annual domestic festival into a large, well-organised public event. The festival has been celebrated as a public event since the time of Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj.

There are four main rituals during the festival - Pranapratishttha - the process of infusing the deity into a murti or idol, Shhodashopachara - 16 forms of paying tribute to Ganesha, Uttarpuja - Puja after which the idol could be shifted after it's infusion, Ganpati Visarjan - immersion of the Idol in the river.



There is a strong belief amongst the Hindus that Ganesha, the God of wisdom and prosperity visits their homes. Everyone tries their best to make him comfortable and happy. This festival is the literal meaning of the thought-- "Guest is God". People pray and share their sorrows and accomplishments with the Ganesha. The ambience during this festival is filled with enthusiasm. When it comes to food, Ganesha and Indians are not shy either. Each and every household has heaps of Modaks ready to be served to Ganesha. Even during the visarjan, people say bye to the Ganesha with a loud and thumping Dhol and tasha. By no means is any effort wasted. It's one of the most energetic festivals of India.

- Duty first
- Parents are omnipotent and respect them.
- Learn to forgive.
- Finish every task you take up with dedication.
- Always stand up for your self-respect.






World First Aid Day



Hindi Diwas is celebrated on the **14th of September**, to commemorate the adoption of Hindi in Devanagari script as one of the official languages in different Hindi speaking states of India. The first Prime Minister of the country, Jawaharlal Nehru, decided to celebrate Hindi Diwas on September 14. Besides Hindi Diwas, World Hindi Day 2020 is celebrated on 10 January. This day in commemoration of the 1st World Hindi Conference was held in Nagpur on 10 January 1975, with the attendance of 122 delegates from 30 countries.

The purpose of the conference is to promote the Hindi language worldwide. World Hindi Day was first celebrated in 2006 by former Prime Minister, Dr Manmohan Singh with the aim of promoting Hindi language worldwide. In 1918, Mahatma Gandhi, widely known as the father of the country, attended a conference on Hindi literature and requested that Hindi be the national language of India. He also called it the language of everyone. Approved by the Constituent Assembly on September 14, 1949 in English, Hindi and the official languages of India. Since 1953, India has commemorated the Hindi Diwas and every September 14th to promote the use of the language.



Basically, the aim is to promote and spread the culture of Hindi Language across the world. After independence, the Government of India set a goal to give an idealized look to the mother tongue of the country and set a target of grammar and orthography using the Devanagari script to bring about standardization in writing. After this, on 14 September, 1949, the Constituent Assembly decided that Hindi will be the official language of India. To propose the importance of this decision and to spread Hindi in every region, on the request of Rashtrabhasha Prachar Samiti, Wardha, from 1953 on 14 September, India is celebrating Hindi Diwas every year. Apart from this, 14 September is also the birthday of Rajendra Singh, who worked tirelessly towards making Hindi the official language of India.

It organizes special gatherings that accompany many leisure activities, where students from almost all schools and universities are held. Highlights of the day include audio reading, essay writing, poetry reading in Hindi, reading Kabir das Ke Dohey, Rahim Ke Dohey, Tulsi Das Ke Dohey, singing, dancing, Hindi general knowledge quiz competitions, plays, etc. On this day, students are especially motivated to give speeches in Hindi, write essays, or do other activities. Even young children at school are given some tasks to write or speak a few lines of Hindi. A very old and famous Hindi song (Ai Malik Tere Bande Hum') is being sung by the students in the group.

Inter-School Competitions are held at various schools to celebrate International Mother Language Day - Hindi Diwas. Students from various schools can participate in various contests, such as Hindi poem recitation (based on the theme of “Hindi Meri Pehchan”)and play contests (based on theme of “Ekta ka Sutra Hindi”), etc. Many of the competitions organized by the school help students to explore their knowledge of Hindi language in different colors and flavors.



Youth of today must come forward and join hands in promoting the language and take pride in being the caretaker of Hindi Language. When we say so; we don't mean that you do away with other languages, such as English or any other language you are comfortable with. We only appeal to all of you to unite India through one language, one nation.





National Service Scheme Day

The National Service Scheme is a public service program conducted by the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports. Aimed at developing a student's personality through community service. Every year, NSS day is observed on September 24 across India. The National Service Scheme was launched in 1969, the birth centenary year of Mahatma Gandhi in 37 universities involving 40,000 students.

The scheme was kicked off by the then Union Education Minister VKRV Rao at 37 universities across all states on September 24, 1969. It has now been extended to all the states and universities of the country.



History of National Service Scheme:-

The University Grants Commission (UGC) that was headed by S Radhakrishnan, had recommended the introduction of voluntary national service in academic institutions post-independence. In the year 1952, the government emphasized the requirement of social and labour service by Indian students for a year.

In 1958, Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru considered the idea of social service as a prerequisite for graduation in his letter to all chief ministers. He also instructed the Ministry of Education to form a competent scheme.

Significance of National Service Scheme:-

The National Service Scheme (NSS) is a central sector scheme of the government of India, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports. It allows the students of 11th & 12th , Technical Institutions, graduate & post-graduate at colleges and university level of India to be a part of various government-led community service activities & programmes.

It aims to provide hands-on experience to young students in delivering community service. Since the formation of NSS in 1969, the number of students has increased from 40,000 to over 3.8 million up to the end of March 2018.

The symbol for the NSS has been taken from the Rath Wheel of the world-famous Konark Sun temple. The eight strokes in the wheel represent 24 hours of a day which is a reminder to be ready in the service of the nation round the clock.

The red colour indicates youth full of passion, energy. The blue colour indicates NSS as a tiny part of the cosmos, always ready to contribute to the welfare of mankind.



Types of Activities:-

There are two types of activities: Regular Activities(120 hours) and Annual Special Camp(120 hours). All the NSS Volunteers who have served NSS for at least 2 years and have performed 240 hours of work under NSS are entitled to a certificate from the university under the signature of the Vice-Chancellor and the Programme Coordinator. The Annual camps are known as Special Camps. Camps are held annually, funded by the government of India, and are usually located in a rural village or a city suburb. Volunteers may be involved in such activities as:

1. Cleaning
2. Afforestation
3. Stage shows or a procession creating awareness of such issues as social problems, education and cleanliness
4. Awareness Rallies
5. Inviting doctors for health camps
6. Community Survey

There are no predefined or pre assigned tasks; it is left up to the volunteers to provide service in any way that is feasible. Camps typically last between a week and 10 days are also conducted by NSS.


World Heart Day is celebrated every year on **29 September**. It is intended to increase public awareness of cardiovascular diseases, including their prevention and their global impact. In 1999 the World Heart Federation (WHF), in conjunction with the World Health Organization (WHO), announced the establishment of World Heart Day. The idea for this annual event was conceived by Antoni Bayés de Luna, president of WHF from 1997–99. World Heart Day was originally (until 2011) observed on the last Sunday in September, with the first celebration taking place on September 24, 2000.



Cardiovascular diseases are the most common cause of death globally. In the early 2000s roughly 17 million people worldwide died from cardiovascular diseases annually. The majority of these deaths were the result of coronary heart disease or stroke. Although cardiovascular diseases are often considered to be afflictions of people living in developed countries, where sedentary lifestyle is common, more than 80 percent of deaths from these diseases occur in low- and middle-income developing countries.

The primary causes of cardiovascular diseases—poor diet, lack of exercise, and smoking—are considered modifiable factors. Thus, even in developing countries, which often lack efficient health care programs, the majority of these diseases can be prevented. Cardiovascular diseases also have a major impact on economic systems within countries, because of the high healthcare costs associated with treatment and lost productivity associated with disability and absenteeism from work.

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The theme given to World Heart Day each year communicates the focus of that year's celebration. The theme of the first event was "Physical Activity." Other themes have included "Women and Heart Disease" in 2003, which was intended to raise awareness of cardiovascular disease in women, and "Know Your Risk!" in 2008, which was aimed at helping individuals identify the factors that place them at risk of cardiovascular disease.





His hesitancy with words taught him the power of saying more with less — and today, these words, inflected with the heart and wisdom that have made him an international icon, continue to inspire countless millions across the globe.



Durga Ashtami

Greetings,

Durga Ashtami or **Maha Ashtami** is one of the most auspicious days of the five days long Durga Puja Festival. Traditionally, the festival is observed for 10 days in all Indian households but, the actual puja that takes place in the 'pandals' is held over a period of 5 days (starting from shashthi).



The eighth day of Navratri or Durga Puja celebrations is known as Durgashtami, or Durga Ashtami. It is also known as Mahashtami and is one of the most auspicious days according to Hinduism. It falls on bright lunar fortnight Ashtami tithi of Aswina month according to the Hindu calendar.

It is believed in some regions, the Goddess Chamunda appeared on this day from the forehead of Mother Durga and annihilated Chanda, Munda, and Rakthabija (the demons who were associates of Mahishasura). The 64 Yoginis and Ashta Shakti or matrikas (the eight ferocious form of Goddess Durga) are worshiped during the Durga Puja rituals on Mahashtami. The Ashta Sati, also known as Eight Shaktis, are interpreted differently in different regions of India. But ultimately, all the eight goddesses are incarnations of Shakti. They are the same powerful Divine Feminine, representing different energies.

The Ashta Shakti worshiped during Durga Puja are Brahmani, Maheswari, Kaumari, Vaishnavi, Varahi, Narasinghi, Indrani and Chamunda.



A tradition associated with Durga Ashtami originated in North India is to honor the kanyaka in the home. A group of young, unmarried girls (a group of five to seven) are invited into the home to honor them. The

tradition is based on the belief that each of these young girls (kanyaka), represents the shakti (energy) of Durga on Earth. The group of girls are welcomed by washing their feet (a common ceremony in India to welcome someone), welcoming them into the home, and then the rituals are done as Alati and Puja. After the rituals the girls are fed sweets and foods and honored with small gifts.

Dussehra

Known as one of the most prominent festivals of the Hindu community, **Dussehra** marks the victory of Lord Rama over the demonic ruler, Ravana who kidnapped Rama's wife, Sita. Also called **Vijayadashami**, this day is celebrated after the conclusion of the **nine-day-long festival of Navratri**. Dussehra is a Sanskrit word which translates to 'ten (dasha) defeat (hara)' in English as it is known that demon King Ravana had 10 heads. According to the **Hindu calendar**, this day falls on the 10th day of the month of **Ashvina**. This year, Dussehra is observed on **15th October**.



History and Significance:-


According to legends, Ravana abducted the wife of Lord Rama which led to a deadly war between them. Demonic King Ravana was given a boon of being indestructible by Lord Brahma. After several events, Rama managed to kill Ravana by shooting an arrow through his belly-button. Therefore, the 10th day of Ashvina month of the Hindu calendar is celebrated as Dussehra, every year.

There's one more legend behind this festival. According to Mahabharat, this day commemorates the victory of Arjuna who single-handedly defeated the entire Kaurava Army. Arjuna is also known as Vijaya and hence, the day he destroyed the army is referred to as the 'Vijaya Dashami'.

Many people throughout the nation celebrate this day as an occasion to honour the victory of good over evil. Devotees in the Eastern parts of India observe this day as the end of Durga Puja which begins with the festival of *Navratri*.

Dussehra Celebrations across India:-

On this day, devotees wear new clothes and organize public festivities commemorating the victory of good over evil in the northern parts of India. Celebrated as the conclusion of the nine-day-long fast of Navratri, Dussehra is observed by organizing a theatrical enactment of Rama's life story which is called **Ram Lila**. Followed by which the effigies of Ravana, his son Meghanada and brother Kumbhakaran are set on fire in open fields throughout the nation. People in the Eastern region of India including West Bengal, Bihar and Odisha observe this day as the end of Durga Puja which is celebrated by wearing a red saree and putting on vermillion. It is observed as an emotional occasion and Bengalis sing folk songs while immersing the idols of Goddess Durga in water bodies.



The underlying spiritual significance of all these traditions behind Dussehra is the victory of good over evil and the resurgence of hope, faith.





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About the United Nations:

The UN came into existence on October 24, 1945. The name 'United Nations' was coined by the United States President Franklin D. Roosevelt and was first used in the Declaration of the United Nations on January 1, 1942, during the Second World War.

The UN had 51 members at the time of its establishment. It is currently made up of 193 Member States. Each of the 193 Member States of the United Nations is a member of the General Assembly.

The organisation has different organs: the General Assembly, the Security Council, the Economic and Social Council, the Trusteeship Council, the International Court of Justice and the UN Secretariat.

History of UN Day:

On this day, the UN Charter was ratified by a majority of signatories, including the five permanent members of the Security Council, which led to the official establishment of the UN.

It was first celebrated on October 24, 1948. Then in 1971, the UN recommended the Member States observe it as a public holiday.



United Nations Day, on 24 October, marks the anniversary of the day in 1945 when the UN Charter entered into force. UN Day, celebrated every year, offers the opportunity to amplify our common agenda and reaffirm the purposes and principles of the UN Charter that have guided us for the past 76 years. Usually held in the General Assembly Hall of the Organization, at Headquarters in New York, a concert is held to mark UN Day. 




Diwali

Diwali, the festival of lights and one of the most important Hindu festivals, is almost here and people have started the preparations for it. A festival that goes beyond cultures and religions, Diwali marks the triumph of good over evil and light over darkness.

The entire country is soaked in the festive spirit and people decorate their houses with rangolis, colourful earthen lamps, candles, lanterns and give wonderful presents to their near and dear ones. What makes Diwali even more special is that this glittering festival continues for five consecutive days- Dhanteras, Naraka Chaturdasi (Choti Diwali), Lakshmi Puja (Diwali), Govardhan Puja and Bhai Dooj. This year, Diwali is celebrated on November 4, 2021, and as per Hindu mythology, it is observed on the day of Amavasya of Krishna Paksha in Kartik month.



Auspicious Days Of Diwali Festival:-

Dhanteras: Dhanteras, also called Dhantrayodashi, is being observed across the country on Tuesday, November 2, 2021. People worship Lord Kubera and Goddess Lakshmi and buy something new on this day. Considered very auspicious, people purchase gold, silver, clothes, gadgets as a sign of good fortune. This day is purely dedicated to the goddess of wealth and it is also believed that Goddess Lakshmi emerged with a pot of gold during 'Amrit-Manthan'.

Naraka Chaturdasi: Naraka Chaturdasi, the second day, also known as Choti Diwali, will be celebrated on Wednesday, November 3, 2021, which is also the 14th day of the Kartik month. According to Hindu tradition and mythology, it is believed that Lord Krishna fought the demon Narakasura and killed him. On Choti Diwali, people wake up early in the morning, apply aromatic oils and bathe with ritualistic scrubs. They wear new clothes, light lamps and diyas and offer puja in the evening.

Lakshmi Puja: The main festive day is Diwali, when people perform Lakshmi Pujan. The main celebration of Diwali takes place on this day and Lord Rama returns to Ayodhya after killing Ravana. People welcome Goddess Lakshmi, the goddess of wealth, who is believed to bless people with luck and prosperity. Lord Ganesha is also worshipped on this auspicious day and people decorate the entire

house with diyas, candles, lights, earthen lamps. Delicious sweets are prepared and gifts are exchanged and people celebrate the evening with joy, happiness, prayers and laughter.

Govardhan Puja: Govardhan Puja is celebrated a day after Diwali and people worship Lord Krishna on this day. People believe that Lord Krishna saved the residents of Mathura from Lord Indra by lifting a mountain named 'Govardhan'. People make miniature clay and cow-dung, symbolising Govardhan and worship them. They also prepare 56 varieties of vegetarian food and drinks for Lord Krishna as a gesture of gratitude.

Bhai Dooj: The last and final day is called the Bhai Dooj or Bhau Beej, which celebrates the special bond of brothers and sisters. It is celebrated on the second day of the Shukla Paksha of the lunar calendar and is similar to Rakshabandhan. On Bhai Dooj, sisters put a tilak on their brothers' forehead and pray for their long and happy life. Sisters also prepare a luscious feast for their brothers on this occasion. Siblings get together on this auspicious occasion and exchange presents, sweets and blessings and this marks the end of the five-day long celebration of joy, lights and radiance.



Diwali is the festival of lights which signifies the victory of good over evil and the eradication of dark shadows, negativity, and doubts from our lives. It is a celebration of prosperity in which people give gifts to their loved ones. The festival also sends the message of illuminating our inner selves with clarity and positivity.







The NCC in India was formed by the Act of 1950 . It can be traced back to the 'University Corps', which was created under the Indian Defence Act 1917, with the objective to make up for the shortage in the Army. In 1920, when the Indian Territorial Act was passed, the 'University Corps' was replaced by the University Training Corps (UTC). The aim was to raise the status of the UTC and make it more attractive to the youth.

During Indo-Pakistani war of 1965 & Bangladesh-Pakistani war of 1971, NCC cadets were the second line of defence. They organized camps to assist ordnance factories, supplying arms and ammunition to the front and also were used as patrol parties to capture enemy paratroopers. The NCC cadets also worked hand in hand with the Civil defense authorities and actively took part in rescue works and traffic control.



The discussion for the motto of NCC was started in the 11th central advisory meeting (CAC) held on 11 August 1978. At that time there were many mottos in mind like "Duty and Discipline"; "Duty, Unity and Discipline"; "Duty and Unity"; "Unity and Discipline". Later, at the 12th CAC meeting on 12 Oct 1980 they selected and declared "Unity and Discipline" as motto for the NCC. In living up to its motto, the NCC strives to be and is one of the greatest cohesive forces of the nation, bringing together the youth hailing from different parts of the country and molding them into united and disciplined citizens of the nation.



On 26 November 1949, the Constituent Assembly of India adopted the Constitution of India, and it came into effect on 26 January 1950.

The Government of India declared 26 November as Constitution Day on 19 November 2015 by a gazette notification. The Prime Minister of India Narendra Modi made the declaration on 11 October 2015 while laying the foundation stone of the B. R. Ambedkar's Statue of Equality memorial in Mumbai. The year of 2015 was the 125th birth anniversary of Ambedkar, who had chaired the drafting committee of the Constituent Assembly and played a pivotal role in the drafting of the constitution. Previously this day was celebrated as Law Day. 26 November was chosen to spread the importance of the constitution and to spread thoughts and ideas of Ambedkar.



Constitution Day is not a public holiday. Various departments of the Government of India celebrated the first Constitution day. As per the Department of Education and Literacy, the preamble of the constitution was read in all schools by all students. In addition, there were quiz and essay competitions both online and offline on the subject of the constitution of India. There was a lecture on salient features of the constitution in each school. The Department of Higher Education requested various universities to arrange mock parliamentary debates in colleges, and the University Grants Commission (UGC) arranged an all-India quiz competition at Ambedkar University, Lucknow, where quiz winners of all states participated.


World AIDS Day was first observed in 1988. Each year, organizations and individuals across the world bring attention to the HIV epidemic, endeavor to increase HIV awareness and knowledge, speak out against HIV stigma, and call for an increased response to move toward Ending the HIV Epidemic in the U.S. In its first two years, the theme of World AIDS Day focused on children and young people. While the choice of this theme was criticized at the time by some for ignoring the fact that people of all ages may become infected with HIV, the theme helped alleviate some of the stigma surrounding the disease and boost recognition of the problem as a family disease.



Campaign became an independent organization. The Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) became operational in 1996, and it took over the planning and promotion of World AIDS Day. Rather than focus on a single day, UNAIDS created the World AIDS Campaign in 1997 to focus on year-round communications, prevention and education. In 2004, the World AIDS

The theme of World AIDS Day 2021 is “End inequalities. End AIDS”. With a special focus on reaching people left behind, WHO and its partners are highlighting the growing inequalities in access to essential HIV services.

In the US, the White House began marking World AIDS Day with the iconic display of a 28 foot (8.5 m) AIDS Ribbon on the building's North Portico in 2007. White House aide Steven M. Levine, then serving in President George W. Bush's administration, proposed the display to symbolize the United States' commitment to combat the world AIDS epidemic through its landmark PEPFAR program. The White House display, now an annual tradition across four presidential administrations, quickly garnered attention, as it was the banner, sign or symbol to prominently hang from the White House since the Abraham Lincoln administration.



As of 2017, AIDS has killed between 28.9 million and 41.5 million people worldwide, and an estimated 36.7 million people are living with HIV, making it one of the most important global public health issues in recorded history. Thanks to recent improved access to antiretroviral treatment in many regions of the world, the death rate from the AIDS epidemic has decreased since its peak in 2005 (1 million in 2016, compared to 1.9 million in 2005).


National Pollution Control Day


Theme for Human Rights Day 2021:



Vijay Diwas is observed every year on **December 16** as a mark of victory over Pakistan in the 1971 war that also led to the creation of Bangladesh.




History of Vijay Diwas



"Without mathematics, there's nothing you can do. Everything around you is mathematics. Everything around you is numbers." - Shakuntala Devi



Aryabhata in the fifth century, followed by Brahmagupta in the next are reckoned to be among the all-time great mathematicians. Over more than the last three decades many of our young men and women with a natural ability in mathematics have not pursued the discipline at advanced levels. This has also resulted in a decline in the quality of our mathematics teachers both at the school and college levels. This perception may have been valid some years ago but today there are many new career opportunities available to mathematicians, and the teaching profession itself has become much more attractive in recent years.



The mathematical community has a duty to find out ways and means to address the shortage of top quality mathematicians in our country. It must reach out to the public particularly in the modern context where mathematics has tremendous influence on every kind of human behavior.

At the young age of 16, Shivaji Maharaj seized the Torna fort and by the age of 17 had seized the Raigad and Kondana forts. Shivaji Maharaj as he is popularly known was named Shivaji Bhosale and was a member of the Bhonsle Maratha clan. Shivaji Maharaj promoted the use of Marathi and Sanskrit in court and administration, rather than using Persian which was the norm in those times.



People celebrate the day with great pride and organize several cultural programs, processions to mark the day.

To commemorate Shivaji Jayanti 2022, here are some of Shivaji Maharaj's life lessons that might inspire others with the values and beliefs he stood for throughout his life:

Respect our own Culture - Regional languages were reintroduced as official languages in his court. This highlights the importance of local languages in preserving our culture; they facilitate communication with all segments of society, allowing us to flourish socially and economically.

Respect Women - He was against all forms of violence, harassment, and disrespect directed towards women. He used to punish anyone who mistreated women, and in some cases, the punishment was harsh. Since childhood, Jijamata taught him about goddess bravery and how Sanatan Dharma honors women.
